Newly Elected Mayor for Sakai City

A candidate from the regional party Osaka Ishin no Kai (One Osaka) won the mayoral election in Sakai, Osaka Prefecture in June 2019. Hideki Nagafuji, a 42-year-old former Osaka Prefectural Assembly member, defeated two other contenders, with a voter turnout of 40.83%. The regional party's Osaka metropolis plan calls for reorganizing the prefectural capital of Osaka into special wards. In April, the party won the Osaka prefectural and mayoral elections. Mayor Nagafuji replaces former Mayor Osami Takeyama who stepped down in April 2019.

Fall Information Display at the Berkeley Public Library Central Branch

In April, 2019, curious to find out whether we could revive the Berkeley Public Library's Central Branch "Berkeley-Sakai Corner" from years back, the Board authorized Member Kate Lucchese to meet with

James Findley of the library's Reference Department to take a look at the small collection of materials and files conserved there.



Kate reported back to the Board that the Library would be happy to let us use their display cases to mount a mini-exhibition about the Berkeley-Sakai sister-city program for the month of September. She and Barbara Strauss offered to set up 5 display cases, and the Komendants generously provided boxes of beautiful gifts and publications from their years with the exchange, while Gary Gibson lent two sets of full Kendo armor from the Sakai Kendo dojo. Information about the items, basic facts about the organization, and the B-S A website address were put in the cases, but also our three-fold fliers were placed near the cases and at the Circulation desk. At the end of September, all but the big vertical cases on the street level were allowed to remain up until the middle of December. By then, All the fliers were gone, and hopefully, we have

raised some community awareness.

The kindergarten students from Libby Trumbull's class at Thousand Oaks Elementary School provided the art for our kindergarten art exchange again this year. Pictures #1-16 were inspired by a Latina artist. The students were supposed to draw their heads and shoulders or whole bodies and objects or activities they enjoy. Pictures #17-27 were completed after studying a prolific young Haitian/Puerto Rican artist, Jean-Michel Basquiat. He began his artistic career spray painting graffitti on buildings in Lower

Michel Basquiat. He began his artistic career spray painting graffitti on buildings in Lower Manhattan. According to Wikipedia, his art "focused on dichotomies such as wealth versus poverty, integration vs segregation and inner versus outer experience." In 2017, 30 years after his death, one of his paintings sold at a Sotheby's auction for \$110.5 million, a record high for any American artist. He taught that all of us are kings or queens so after drawing a face and shoulders self-portrait you could add a crown to show how special you are. You could add a halo if you were really, really special. Basquist liked bright colors so the students prepared their background papers by laying out bright tissue paper scraps and applying vinegar to release the color. When that dried they painted using black tempera paint. They were excited to know their paintings are being shown in a country far away. They are also looking forward to seeing Japanese writing on their stories.
